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
Memorable Flight 56 from Toronto to Dubai


The pictures tell the story more dramatically, so I'll leave you to view the images.



There are also some Cham temples around, built by Hindu kings from In,dia over a thousand years ago which we just passed as we had to rush to our next destination, Dalat.
















Oman also has several beautiful wadis, or dry riverbeds, that are popular among tourists for their natural beauty and adventure activities.


