




My sister Rafia Aboobakar had invited us for breakfast so after winding our way through the abundant sugarcane fields, we landed at her place, met the entire family, exchanged old memories and proceeded to our villa in Flic en Flac, supposedly the best beach in Mauritius. Since our villa was sited just across from the beach, we had gorgeous views all through. My grandson and I decided to do some reconnaissance and drove through fields, mountains and small villages to a volcano, Trou De Cerfs, near the city of Curepipe. It was a little disappointing as the foliage around the crater walls was so thick, we could hardly see the bottom. Anyway, the drive gave us a glimpse into the glories we would experience during our trip.



Later we stopped at Ile De Benitiers where we could stroll along the sandy beach or swim, after which we returned to our starting point, very satisfied with a day well spent.


The exquisite beach at Blue Bay

On our third day, I had planned a full day excursion to the North of the island, Grand Bay, where I had booked a sunset cruise. Enroute, we passed some rugged cliffs where caves had been carved by the sea crashing against them. Later we wound through Port Louis, the capital city, of which we had a bird's eye view from on top of a hill where a statue of Mother Mary overlooked the capital. While driving to Grand Bay we had a very cursory glance at the Botanical Garden where the huge lotus leaves spread across a pond were of great interest.


While Grand Bay itself was a beautiful beach with yachts bobbing up and down in the light blue sea, the cruise itself turned out to be a whimper compared to the cruise the day before. The staff were quite rude and the snacks very paltry. Even the sunset could have been seen from anywhere on the west coast of the island. Anyway, we were all together, joking and laughing and that was great!! My mischievous grandson picked up a beer bottle (alchoholic drinks/soft drinks were complimentary), put it in my hand and took pictures which he sent out to our entire family, scandalising them!!!

All part of the fun!!! The next day, we drove into the mountains which make up the spine of the island, our aim being the highlight of a tour of Mauritius, Tamarind Falls. We had not realised that to see the falls at close range entailed a trek of about 4/5 hours through tricky terrain so we opted to drive to a viewpoint across the valley where we could gaze at the falls but from a distance.


Anyway, since it was drizzling, we were told that it was too slippery to undertake the trek. The views across the gorge of the thickly forested hills and the view of the sea through the gorge was stupendous. As a bonus, we saw rainbows four times in the space of just ten minutes!! The next day was another mountain drive to Chameral where a sort of rainbow mountain had been carved into the hills, with many colours, mainly brown, mauve and maroon could be seen on the ripples eroded by air and water. Interesting but not overwhelming! We drove along the mountain roads and had a stop at the Macande viewpoint where the road takes a sharp u turn alongside the sea, one of the iconic sights in Mauritius. With the blue sea on both sides, it made a picture postcard scene.

Since the majority of the population are Indians, and a majority of Indians are Hindus, a large number of colourful temples are scattered all over the island. The main pilgrimage place is aptly called Ganga talao (lake) around which a number of temples have been built. We climbed to a viewpoint from where the entire setting with forested mountains and the blue sea in the background, was quite stunning.





Views of the temples and deities at Ganga Talao (above) and a panoramic view of Ganga Talao (below)



We had shifted from our villa in Flic en Flac to what was mundanely called 21 LB llot Fortier, but it had a gorgeous, sublime setting, right on the water where we could just sit, sip tea and enjoy an absolutely stunning view. We had some stupendous sunrise views right from our balcony. The site was so bewitching that we invited my sister and her family to have dinner with us,. However, the dinner came from them and we had a very enjoyable evening. After seeing this villa, they decided to spend a weekend at this delectable spot


Nearby is the most famous mountain of Mauritius, Le Morne, which is one of the hikes one must do to get superlative views of the ocean in all its glory. And that's what we did one day, rising at 5.00 am to reach the starting point by 7.00 am and start the pretty steep climb (but there were some who practically jumped across the hurdles and hurtled upward). One of those who did a fast climb, was my grandson, who was the only one from our family to reach the peak, with the last part requiring scrambling over boulders and climbing a ladder! Hats off!. I could make it a little more than half way till a viewpoint providing gorgeous views on both sides of the mountain. I sipped my coffee (a thermos full of the brew was prepared every morning before we set out, only for me!!!).












Another novel experience was a drive to Pont Natural, an almost hidden gem on the east coast, close to the village of Souillac. We were having lunch and as I was trying to find another spot to visit, when I suddenly came across this. Though not far, it was way off the main road, the small lane passing through sugarcane fields for as far as the eye could see. The road was also strewn with large rocks and extremely muddy and slippery. We thought of turning back but I insisted and the driver, Mr Ravisen, from Tamil Nadu, India, was sporting enough to brave the hurdles and take us to the very scenic spot. Steep black cliffs dove straight into the sea with sea erosion causing very peculiar formations including a bridge (pont in French, we were told by Mr Ravisen). We walked along the cliffs, admiring the waves crashing against the cliffs which stretched as far as the eye could see. A fortunate find.





A superb experience, which no one should miss.


With that, our absolutely marvellous, unforgettable visit to Paradise came to an end as we boarded our flight to India early the next morning.





A glorious sunset over the Black River gorges (above) and the huge lotus leaves in Pample mousses botanical garden (below)










Huge banyan trees, many with reddish roots hanging down, can be observed in many parts of the island




Cape Mahlebourg, on the northern tip of Mauritius provides some gorgeous sea views





Information for Mauritius Travellers

We had organised our transport and accommodation before departing for Mauritius. I am sharing the details for information of intending travellers, as many expressed interest in going there, after seeing some of the pictures I shared.

I researched a large number of taxi providers and zoomed in on KIRBY ARBISTEUR, with whom I had full discussions regarding our requirements. Mr Shueb who was the contact person, was very co-operative and helped us out of many tricky situations. His Whatsapp number is +230 5836 4657

We also organised 3 accommodations, one through Air B& B and two through Booking.com. We stayed in Rock Villa in Flic en Flac thru Air B& B, 21 LB ILOT FORTIER in the south of the island and Villa Kai at Trou deu Deuce, both thru Booking.com. While the second had the most scenic location, it was also extremely comfortable for our family of 6. The last was also superbly located overlooking the sea and very close to the point from where we were to take our cruise for Isle de Cerfs. The names of the contact persons are given here.
